



## Daisy Money Counts

You can use money to buy things. You can use it to help other people, too. Let's find out more about money!

1. Put a pile of coins on a table. Search through the coins for a penny, nickel, dime, and a quarter. What is the same and different about each coin? Which one is the largest? What color is each coin? With your family play a game by picking a coin out of a jar and shouting out the name and its worth.

Circle enough pennies to equal one dime.



2. Money comes as coins and bills. Different coins and bills are worth different amounts of money. Complete the worksheet using quarters, dimes and nickels to make a dollar.
