What I did...

Ex: I attended a program on how to write a college essay. We learned how to find the essay prompts required by the schools I'm interested in, dissected essay prompts, and read examples of essays. I learned that no matter what the essay prompt says, the essay should be about me.

Ex: At the babysitting training program I attended I earned my Red Cross Pediatric First Aid and CPR certification. I will put a copy of this in my portfolio. Now that I can do first aid and CPR as I babysit, I want to learn how to do it on adults next. I'll be researching local classes to receive this additional certification.

I'm most proud of...

Reflect on your thinking, learning, and work as you completed the badge steps or participated in the program. What are you most proud of that you did? Did you try a new activity? Public speak? Teach others? Ex: I spoke to a group of 15 Brownies and their troop leaders when leading the activity on the Girl Scout Promise and Law. Public speaking isn't my favorite thing to do so I'm proud of myself for doing this.

Programs/Badge Lead Self Evaluation Details and Examples

Program or Badge: What badge or program did you lead? *Ex: I led Troop 12345 to earn their Daisy Eco Learner Badge*

Learning Objective/s: What did you want your audience to learn/do/take away from the activities you were leading?

Ex: wanted the Daisys to learn about ways to protect the environment when they go outside. I also wanted them to be inspired to spend more time outdoors by doing fun activities outside while earning the badge.

What did you do: Describe the program or the badge-work you led in as much detail as possible. You can always use these activities or ideas again when leading another program or badge-work. *EX: Step 1:* Be prepared to protect nature - I brought examples of things you might want to bring when going outdoors (water bottle, raincoat, sunscreen, bug spray, etc) and things to leave behind (iPad, stuffed animal, toaster, etc) and had them sort the items into "Take" and "Leave" piles. They shared with the group why they made their choices Step 2: Keep living things safe - We went on a nature walk and kept track of how many different animal signs we could see. We talked about ways to be respectful of the living things in nature when exploring. Step 3: Learn how to protect nature from trash - we put on gloves and picked up trash along the trail. After washing our hands I broke them into small groups and they created skits about the impact leaving trash in nature can have, and how they can help.

What went well? What worked well for you as a leader? EX: I was able to use the Girl Scout quiet sign effectively with the group to get their attention.

What would you change for next time? If you could do anything differently next time what would it be? *Ex: Next time I would ask the troop leader if we could take snacks on our nature walk with us and stop for a picnic.*

What did you learn? Were you well prepared? Were you able to pivot when things didn't go to plan? *Ex: I learned that Daisies have a shorter attention span than I thought. Having extra activities prepared is helpful when they're ready to move to the next thing.*

What can you improve upon? What specific strategies or activities can you do to improve particular skills to do better next time you lead a program or badgework? *Ex: I would have a few extra games in mind that we could do on the nature walk.*

Highest Award Review

Project Title

What I did...

Summarize the issue you addressed (what you did for your project. Who was your target audience and what impact did you have? *Ex: Due to increased traffic near my local elementary school there was an increase in the need for knowledge about pedestrian safety, especially for children.*

I ran three interactive in person programs to teach children how to be a safe pedestrian and adults how to drive safely in the presence of pedestrians. I also created children's printable activity book to reach students who weren't able to come to presentations. The school agreed to print the activity books annually to pass out to students at the beginning of each school year.

Measurements

How did you measure your project's success? Share your measurements. Include quantifiable data like hours spent, how much money raised or how many people you led on your team. *Ex: I spent 102 hours on my Gold Award project, leading a team of 7 volunteers. I ran three programs in my community, with a total attendance of 170 people. I achieved 79 downloads of my printable activity book I posted on my website, and had 689 hits on my website.*

Ex: I learned how to break a large goal down into smaller, more manageable goals along the way. I can use this while working on my college applications, and eventually in college when working on projects.

Ex: I am most proud of being able to pivot when my installation of my project, which was originally approved by the city, was later denied. I decided to focus more on educating my community and was able to have a larger impact that way.

Resilience- Overcoming the major obstacles in my project taught me to keep going and find a solution Organization - Managing a team of 7 to help me spread the word about my in-person program was key. The turnout wouldn't have been as large if I hadn't mapped out the areas of the community each person would target for advertising.

Presentation Skills - Over the course of my three programs I became more comfortable speaking to large group.

Decision Making - I improved my decision making skills because I had to make the final call on all decisions since the project was mine.
