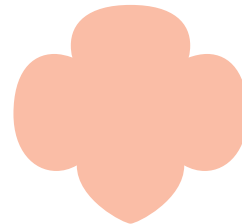
GSSEM History

On January 1, 2009, as part of the national Girl Scout realignment movement, four Girl Scout councils in Southeastern Michigan merged to create one high-capacity, high-performance council. Michigan Waterways, Metro Detroit, Otsikita, Fair Winds, and portions of Maumee Valley and Heart of Michigan merged to become Girl Scouts of Southeastern Michigan.

Year after year, we are thrilled—and deeply grateful—for the ongoing commitment to GSSEM and Girl Scouting displayed by our volunteers, supporters and of course, Girl Scouts. We know that the impact of Girl Scouting is real and sustained, as girls discover new interests, build skills, challenge themselves, and support their communities in meaningful ways.

GSSEM continues to take a deeper look at the world in which girls are growing up, ensuring that our programs and strategic community and philanthropic partnerships help Girl Scouts become “real world ready.” In 2025, GSSEM advanced our white paper series examining gaps in STEAM education access, the need for increased access to global citizenship opportunities for women and girls, and more investment in whole-child development amid economic challenges. GSSEM remains committed to helping Girl Scouts be the leaders prepared and equipped to address these and other societal challenges now and in the future.

To that end, we were so proud and excited to finally take possession of the GSSEM Mobile STEAM Lab (MSL). Powered by General Motors, Comcast, and The Vilcek Foundation, the MSL rolled into the parking lot of our Detroit Service Center on a blustery spring morning in March 2025. Since then, GSSEM has worked continuously to bring STEAM career exploration, coding, robotics, and other STEAM experiences to Girl Scouts and youth throughout the region. In MY24/25, GSSEM was honored to be selected as one of four councils chosen to send four Girl Scouts to serve as delegates to the United Nations 69th Session of the

Commission on the Status of Women. These Girl Scouts had the opportunity to discuss Girl Scouts’ international advocacy, share their thoughts on worldwide issues, and make their voices heard on issues central to women’s rights and female empowerment. GSSEM is grateful to The Skillman Foundation for a generous grant to support the travel and expenses for our delegates. Their support in this life-changing experience is a testament to the power of philanthropic support for girls’ leadership development.

We all know the saying—Girl Scouts is about so much more than cookies, camp, and crafts. At GSSEM we know the same is true for girls! Girls want to be civically engaged. They want to build lasting friendships and supportive relationships that encourage them to reach their goals. They want to be a part of changing the world. With the unyielding support of caring volunteers and mentors, meaningful investment in girls’ leadership development, and programming and experiences that only Girl Scouts can offer, we know girls will do all of this and more.

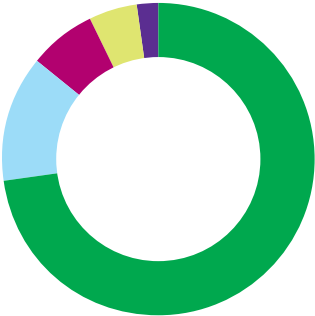

In Membership Year 2025, GSSEM volunteers benefited from several key training enhancements. To address a growing need for finance support, the Volunteer Experience team launched the Managing Troop Finances course, serving 282 volunteers. MY25 also introduced the first asynchronous Cookie Rookie training, allowing new troop leaders to prepare for the Cookie Program at their own pace beginning in November 2024. Additional offerings included five ability and inclusion trainings focused on supporting Girl Scouts with ADHD, autism, and other needs.

In March 2025, deep-linking was added to simplify access to training content. The State of the Troop Leader survey debuted in April 2025, giving volunteers a dedicated space to share feedback across the volunteer experience. Results showed that 78% of Troop Leaders reported an overall positive experience with GSSEM.

Introduction of the MSL

In the spring of 2025, GSSEM launched the Mobile STEAM Lab (MSL), a traveling classroom offering hands-on learning experiences in coding, robotics, engineering, and science. Thanks to our funders, General Motors, Comcast, and the Vilcek Foundation. The inaugural pilot program for the MSL occurred from April until June 2025.

2025 Young Woman of Distinction

Each year, GSSEM honors one Gold Award Girl Scout as its Young Woman of Distinction—an exceptional young leader whose Gold Award project stands out and creates sustainable, measurable change. In 2025, that distinction went to Emma Beach, who addressed the nationwide shortage of canine blood donations after discovering how few dog owners know this lifesaving need exists. She created **PumpingPups.org**, a national database connecting dog owners to 40 canine blood banks across 27 states and developed a real-time inventory system to help veterinarians locate blood products more efficiently. Emma also launched an awareness campaign through veterinary clinics, dog parks, pet stores, social media, and even connected with the American Red Cross to expand outreach. A lifelong animal advocate, Emma graduated from Rochester Adams High School and attends Michigan State University’s Lyman Briggs College to study animal science.
